(USA) Alabama's Republican governor signed the most stringent abortion legislation in the nation Wednesday, making performing an abortion a felony in nearly all cases. "This legislation stands as a powerful testament to Alabamians' deeply held belief that every life is precious and that every life is a sacred gift from God," Gov. Kay Ivey said in a statement.

Figures from the Royal Institute of Technology in Stockholm show that only 18% of all payments made today in Sweden are in cash. Meanwhile figures from the Swedish Trade Federation show that most Swedish retailers say that 80% of their commerce is from card payments. Such is the appetite for digital commerce in Sweden that many predicted it could become the world's first cashless society

One essential point of Gänswein's homily (Archbishop Georg Gänswein, personal secretary of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI and Prefect of the Papal Household): the fidelity of a priest to the Church's perennial teaching and tradition — to what has been handed down from the beginning, to what had been held as true by all, everywhere, in all

times — this fidelity is a *good and noble thing*. And, since this is so, he argues, the desire to “invent a new Church” different from the Church of our fathers is a temptation which, though perhaps understandable, must be resisted. He compares this fidelity to that of a simple lighthouse keeper. A lighthouse keeper fulfills his task by keeping the lighthouse lit, always in the same place. The lighthouse is useful precisely because it never moves. Any attempt to move the lighthouse — perhaps out of a desire to bring the lighthouse closer to those sailing on the sea — would only confuse those at sea, who look to the light of the lighthouse, never moving from its place, to orient their course even in the most difficult seas and storms. So the lighthouse keeper remains at his post, and in so doing, offers help and safety to all seafarers, in all weather, in all storms.(In Side the Vatican May 2, 2019).(Fantastic thoughts).

If used in a spirit of faith, sacramentals can protect us from spiritual harm or inspire us to live a holy life dedicated to God. If used properly, they can provide a spiritual boost to the home as well as keep away spiritual enemies that are lurking in the shadows.
