2nd Feb. Presentation of the Lord 'What's happening at the Presentation of the Lord?' Later this week the Church celebrates the Presentation of the Lord. It's a feast that happens every year on February 2nd. We read about the presentation of the Lord in Luke 2, but the text can be a little mysterious. What is actually *happening* there? Some claim that Luke himself didn't know . . . Here is what Luke actually says about the event . . . And when the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every male that opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord") and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." He then records the encounters with Simeon and Anna the prophetess, but at the moment our focus is what Luke refers to as "their purification." What is he talking about? The first thing to note is that Luke is not talking about the time of Jesus' circumcision. That occurred on the eighth day after his birth. Luke has already talked about that and is now referring to a later time. Specifically, he's talking about the fortieth day after Christ's birth. We know that because of he quotes from Leviticus 12:8 ("a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons"), which refers to the purification ritual that a Jewish mother needed to perform to become ritually clean again after childbirth.

On Wednesday, 31st January, the day of the Jewish New Year of Trees (Tu biShvat) all are invited to plant 24 trees in our church garden from 4pm. Tu biShvat relates to the cycles of the seasons in Israel and is also known as "the birthday of the trees". In Israel on this day people take shovels and hoes, and go singing happily to plant trees. Afterwards they have parties singing songs, eating fruit and dancing around the trees. In the Diaspora (countries outside of Israel) Jewish people plant seeds or trees where they live, or send money to Israel to have trees planted on their behalf. This custom of Tu biShvat developed in ancient Israel. While going into exile they carried on these customs as a remembrance of their homeland whilst wandering in faraway lands.....Australia.

The Veneration of St Blaise (d. c. 316) In many places on 3rd February – his feast day – people gather in churches for the blessing of throats. The blessing is a sign of the people's faith in God's protection and love for the sick. Using two crossed and unlighted candles, the priest (or other minister) touches the throat of each person, saying: *Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from all ailments of the throat and from every other evil: + in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.* The most significant detail tells that when Blaise had been captured and was on his way to prison, a boy was brought to him in danger of choking from a fishbone stuck in his throat. Blaise prayed over him and he was cured. Perhaps to fill out his healing credentials, it is also reported that before he was chosen as bishop, Blaise had practised as a physician.
